Please note that Mr. Trad's 40 bid is a Cue-bid in order to inhibit a diamond lead!!!

Mr. Kunin went on to say that the Swiss Federation is a small one, and to encourage interest is their most important task. If you use new players now and then to represent a country abroad, this always encourages interest.

The Swiss team in Oslo consists of four experienced and two inexperienced players. It's always better, of course, if all are experienced, but the six / Over

Swiss players are all good friends, which compensates for a lot of things.

Your reporter's long understanding of this situation is that, following a Two Club bid, it is proper to show second round controls. In persuance of this understanding, Four Clubs must be the cue bid which would leave most room to manoevre. Apparently the young Scottish pair view the situation otherwise and prefer to show only first round controls.

Since Silverstone with the North hand was too powerful not to take positive action, he chose instead to bid a conventional 4N.T. His partner, conscious of the limitations of his high-card strength for an opening Two Club bid, (see diagram below) decided it was more prudent to show two aces rather than two aces and a void, for which the machinery existed. As far as North was concerned, this meant that they were missing two aces, and understandably he passed Five Spades.

A fine opportunist double by dapper Norwegian-shirt-wearing English Stock Broker Claude Rodrigue earned Britain the whole of their half-time lead against France in their fifteenth round match yesterday.

Realising that the double would have been based on a good diamond holding, Boulenger decided it

was a good moment for a redouble, a decision he was to regret by the end of the hand.

Rodrigue led the $\lozenge 7$ which declarer won with dummy's $\lozenge J$ and, in an attempt to camouflage his precarious position, switched to the $\lozenge K$. Rodrigue ducked this trick, but won the continuation of the $\lozenge Q$, cashed the $\lozenge A$ and continued with the $\lozenge 9$. Declarer won with the $\lozenge Q$ and took his two club tricks, and then led a small spade to dummy's $\lozenge 10$. The defence won the next six tricks and in the end declarer found himself in the unenviable position of having to decide whether to discard the $\lozenge K$ or the $\lozenge A$ from dummy to hold his loss to 1,000 points. Fortunately for France he chose correctly.

In the other room the British pair lost 50 points in 1 N.T., for a swing of 14 IMPs, at which point I hoisted my Union Jack again. (See p. 3.)

East drew three rounds of trumps took the heart finesse with his fingers crossed and discarded a club on the VK. He then cashed the QA-K, noting the fall of the QJ from North. If this is true - but is it true? - the rest is easy. Risking as little as possible, East ran the spades and South had to surrender.

However this may be, Fitzgerald and Seligman, perhaps judging that this was the only way to beat the Italian juggernaut, reached 3 N.T. on a combined 22-count, whilst the Italians were content to play in Two Spades

making nine tricks.

Against his 3 N.T. contract Seligman got the lead of the $\lozenge 3$, dummy's $\lozenge 10$ holding, and declarer was careful to drop the $\lozenge 6$. A finesse of the $\lozenge J$ held and then a small heart to dummy's queen fell to East's king. East returned another diamond and South continued the deception with the $\lozenge 7$. West won and, not unreasonably failing to find the club switch, led another diamond ... and the rest is silence.

The Irish players were heartily congratulated by the Italians on their win - Mr. Seligman tells us that they are the most courteous opponents possible, polite, charming and encouraging, which only bears out what we have been told by their other less fortunate opponents.

Against Garozzo's Six Diamond contract the Polish North led the QQ taken by declarer's ace. The VA was cashed, dummy's second spade being discarded. Garozzo then led a small diamond and, when North showed out, put in dummy's Q10, allowing one of South's honours to win. South returned

a spade, ruffed on the table. Seeing that he needed better than a 4-0 club break for success, he then cashed the $\$ A and, when both defenders followed, he cashed the $\$ A and led a small diamond, finessing South's $\$ Q. The inferences of the bidding had given him the clue as to the club situation, in addition to which he took the best mathematical odds. He led the $\$ J and when North failed to cover, let it run, dutifully making twelve tricks for a score of 1370. It was a win of 12 IMPs on the board as, in the other room, the Poles played in a quiet 3 N.T. making eleven tricks on the lead of the $\$ O10.

Throughout the tournament Harold Franklin and Joseph Van den Borre have been the Chief Tournament Directors, ably assisted by an excellent staff of Norwegian Directors.
