APPEALS COMMITTEE -

The first half match Great Britain - Denmark finished twenty-three minutes behind time in the Open Room. The Tournament Director had given due warning to the players that they were late, and that they were risking a penalty of Victory Points.

At the conclusion of the first half of the match, the teams were penalised 2 V.Ps. This decision was reported to Mr. Werner who was on duty, as a representative of the E.B.L. Mr. Werner found this ruling to be in accordance with the Laws.

The matter was brought to the attention of the Appeals Committee in the forenoon of 5th July. After hearing the Tournament Director on duty, the Captains of both teams, Mr. Werner and the scorer at the table, the Appeals Committee upholds the decision of the Tournament Director, making the result of the match 3V.P. to Denmark, 1 V.P. to Great Britain.

This decision was unanimous.

We simply report to you, therefore, that the victorious team in Oslo, 1969 were Giorgio Belladonna, Benito Bianchi, Paolo Frendo, Benito Garozzo, Guiseppe Messina and Renato Mondolfo, with n.p. c. Umberto Barsotti.

The battle for second place was still open with all results in except the local Rama drama. When this eventually came through, the host country had added 7 V.P to their overnight score, to retain their runner-up position. They were Erik Höie, Louis Andre Ström, Knut Koppang, Björn Larsen, Tore Jensen and Willy Varnas, with n.p.c. Bard Bardsen.

is more encouraging To bid Seven Glubs, North would need to know the values precisely. Garozzo commented that Yalouze and Omar Shariff, using the Trefle Blue Club, would certainly bid Seven Clubs, but perhaps he himself would have been a little more prudent.

Belladonna came up with a somewhat different sequence using the same system. Admitting that he hadn't got 17 points, he liked the South hand:
